Curriculum News

New Primary Language Curriculum As you will be aware from Dojo posts, we are working hard to engage in the implementation of the new Primary Language Curriculum. The new curriculum focuses on the language learning journey and its development. The rationale underpinning the new PLC looks at how language shapes who we are, how it is a developmental and integrated process, how language is contextual and how children learn best through interactions. We see the Aistear model as being extremely effective for the promotion of **language** development through play. The new PLC has now been opened up to senior classes so we will be working to learn more about how to embed it in our teaching of older students in the coming months.



To facilitate this process, there will be **two half day closures**; one in term 2 and one in term 3 for professional development in this area. As soon as we have dates, we will inform parents. If you would like to learn more about this new curriculum, have a look at the following website :

What is the Digital Learning Framework?



The **Digital Learning Framework** has been developed to assist schools in effectively embedding digital technologies into teaching and learning. It provides clarity for school leaders and education providers in how to create a shared vision for how technology can best meet the needs of all learners.

We were developing our poetry skills by writing our own poems, we adapted 'Mary had a Little Lamb' by putting in different names and animals some of them sounded very funny! We also wrote some poems about our favourite colour. 
